Supervisory Neglect occurs whenever a caregiver's supervisory decisions or behaviors place a child in his or her care at significant ongoing risk for physical, emotional or psychological harm.

Supervisory neglect, similar to general neglect, is difficult to define.

- Recognize the complex interplay of child, parental, familial, community, and societal factors which all contribute to the occurrence of neglect.
